



IBC was established with the approval of the Higher Education Commission of Thailand. The degrees are accredited and recognized by the Thai government.








History

The idea of starting a university offering courses in different Buddhist traditions was first raised by Professor Karunadasa when he taught at the Than Hsiang Buddhist Research Center in Penang in 1996. The Center had started running courses offered by the Buddhist and Pali University of Sri Lanka in 1994. The Professor saw an interesting mixture of different Buddhist traditions in this part of the world and felt that we really had the unique background to embark on an international Buddhist college project.



History

The International Buddhist College (IBC) is an international institute of higher learning offering quality Buddhist education within a spiritually dedicated, non-sectarian, modern and scholastic environment.

Our first batch of BA students started in the Academic Year 2004.

It was officially opened in July 17, 2005 by the Vice-Minister of Education of Thailand, Mr. Piyabutr Cholvijarn.



• A student who achieved an average Conduct GPA of 3.76 or above will receive a certificate plus a cash award of 1,000 THB.


